SHALOM, B'NAI TIKVAH!

Many years ago as the story in my family goes, at my grandparents' yearly Passover Seder, my uncle was sent to open the door for Elijah when the appointed time came. He did so, and at just that moment, encountered a very surprised paperboy! It was the Seder no one around that table

forgot. Neither, I imagine, did a certain paperboy from Flint, Michigan – wherever he is now.

What's your family story?

Time after time, surveys of contemporary Jewish practices indicate that of all our holidays, the most widely celebrated one is Passover. Possible reasons for this abound; among them may be how beautifully the holiday lets each of us in. The narrative itself is undeniably compelling and asks us to contend with questions that stimulate our minds and stir our hearts. What do we make of the fact that other people suffered so that ours could find freedom? How does the mandate that we remember the stranger, having been strangers in Egypt, affect how we react to suffering around the world today?

We are taught that whoever enlarges upon the telling of the Passover story deserves praise. This can be done in so many ways. We enlarge upon the telling when we keep our own family stories of this holiday alive. We do so when we look anew at the holiday's rituals and symbols and find ways of making them our own. We do so when we read of those four children – wise, rebellious, simple and unable to ask – and acknowledge that at different life stages and moments, they represent us all. And we especially enlarge upon the telling when we turn to the youngest faces at our tables and help them feel that this is their story too – of which they will become the new bearers. New Seder leaders are waiting to emerge, new questions to be asked, new stories to be told.

With all of this, Passover also brings a message of hope. After a long period of enslavement for our ancestors, the story encourages us to notice the warmth and blossoming now beginning to take hold. The narrow places which the Hebrew word *Mitzrayim* refers to still exist, but so does our ability to find liberation from them. As a former congregant once put it, in words I can't forget: "What does this mean for us? Tie your shoes. Rest well. Drive safely. Be gentle, steadfast and just, and we will make it through Exodus to see the promise of Spring."

A Zissen Pesach – may it be a sweet Pesach for us all.

REFLECTIONS...

I returned recently from a gathering of fellow clergy and community leaders having learned a new term for the kind of rabbi that many people are aspiring to be these days: spiritual entrepreneur. It refers (in the Jewish world at least) to the many cantors and rabbis who are

responding to the rapidly changing Jewish world by creating a new kind of Jewish community, one that is rich in meaning and tradition, and equally full of creativity and innovation. These leaders are creating vibrant lewish communities that show a demonstrated success in attracting unaffiliated and disengaged Jews, because they are blending the two magnetic forces that are constantly searching for balance in our faith: a deep yearning for tradition, for our roots to be grounded, while simultaneously reaching for innovation and thinking that does not fit into any traditional model or definition. This is a challenging balance to reach for any community, but especially for synagogues like CBT, places that have thrived historically based on one model of Judaism, and who find themselves struggling with membership against the tide of alternatives in the contemporary Jewish world. It is one thing to start your own synagogue today. Another thing entirely to try to innovate from within an established one.

To help find my way through this changing Jewish landscape, I have been turning to our rabbinic texts for guidance, and I have found some comfort and perspective in a famous passage from the *Mishnah*, Menachot 29b. Moses is at Mt Sinai, where he finds God affixing crowns to the letters of the Torah, and Moses questions God's actions. "Why are you, God of the Universe, adding flourishes to the Torah text? Isn't the Torah you are giving me complete? Isn't it perfect as is?" God's response is that one day, there will be a rabbi named Akiva who will be able to discern meaning from the crowns that God is putting onto the letters. It is not Moses's job to know how to interpret the crowns. That is a job for future generations. It's like a secret code that will only be revealed long after Moses is gone.

And who is that future generation that is meant to understand the crowns? The Mishnah was certainly referring to its own rabbis, but I believe that it is the job of every single generation of Jews to discover and reveal the oral Torah that was destined for that generation alone, including ours. If that is the case, then who are the modern rabbis to whom our tradition is being entrusted today? I would venture to say that it is anyone who is open to it, who is yearning for it, any of the spiritual entrepreneurs who feel powerfully

CYCLES

Shalom B'nai Tikvah -

How true that word Shalom rings true right now. This issue of Tikvah Talk comes just a few weeks after the Christchurch, New Zealand Mosque massacre where 50 people were killed

and scores were injured in yet another senseless act of violence. The seemingly relentless attacks on people of faith is tragic, and we at CBT stand with those grieving all of the losses over the past several months. The day of the attack, Rabbi Gutterman, Cantor Chabon and I sent a letter of condolence to the Interfaith Council of Contra Costa County expressing our solidarity with those grieving. We stand united with the Council in its denunciation of any acts of violence and intolerance.

So why title my column in this issue "Cycles"? Well, my deepest hope is that these cycles of violence are just that – a cycle we're going through as a society where hate, bigotry, and the never-ending news feeds carry tragedies to our consciousness with frightening familiarity. In the face of this tragedy and others before it, we are making changes at B'nai Tikvah to tighten our security. Some of these changes you'll see and others will be less visible, but here are some highlights:

- 1. Improvements to our alarm and surveillance systems including better cameras, stronger door locks, and changes to how we monitor those coming to our facility.
- 2. Tighter integration with city and county law enforcement. We have always had a good relationship with local law enforcement, but we are taking steps to improve notifications for large events and increase the visibility of law enforcement.
- 3. Region- and Nation-wide coordination through local resources including the Anti-Defamation League, Jewish Community Relations Council, Contra Costa County Jewish Community Center, and other local synagogues.
- 4. Greeting at services and gatherings: Some of you may have noticed that we are locking the doors to the synagogue after services start and implementing added screening for people entering our facilities. These controls are meant to keep us safe during services and include an early alert 'panic button' system in the unlikely event it will be needed.

Some of these changes have already been implemented thanks to the tireless work of our Security Committee led by Sam Sorokin. Sam has elevated our security already and continues to educate the Board and professional staff about security considerations. Thank

THE STRENGTH OF SHARED EXPERIENCES

Growing up in Israel my brother and I used to wait for Saturdays, the only weekend day in Israel. On Saturdays, we'd get up, eat challah with butter and cheese, and plan where to go on a day trip. Some of my best memories as a child are sitting with my

brother in the back of the car and laughing our heads off together, about things that today I cannot even recall. Although those Shabbat mornings were not religious per se, they became the way in which our family made Shabbat sacred – a family day in which we enjoyed each other's company. It is those experiences and memories that fill my heart with love for my brother and bind us together as a family.

One of the strengths of Judaism is that sense of the shared history we and our ancestors have gone through. We are told time and again that it was we who left Egypt, not some far away people. It is we who have been gifted with freedom, coming out of a parting sea to inherit the Promised Land. Those shared experiences bind our people together in history, culture, and experiences.

These experiences are extremely important in creating context for education, enriching and deepening the learning and binding all of us to one another. This year we have focused our efforts on taking each and every one of our grades on a field trip, so our kids can share a learning experience outside of our classroom walls. Our classes in the past few months have gone on field trips to the International Jewish Film Festival, Contemporary Jewish Museum, Urban Adamah, Tilden Little Farm, Grand Bakery to bake challah, and The Reutlinger Community.

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

SMALL ACTS OF KINDNESS

Five days after the devastating massacre at the Tree of Life Synagogue in Pittsburgh, a plate of cookies appeared at our office, with a handwritten card explaining that the children of the Orinda Community Church had baked them for us to let us know we are not alone.

I'm driving south on 680 down to the San Ramon Valley Islamic Center with a basket and a card. It's the afternoon of Erev Purim, 5 days since a white supremacist took the lives of 50 Muslims in New Zealand. It's only been 5 months since Pittsburgh. As I pull off the freeway, I think to myself, maybe I should've called ahead, made sure someone was going to be there, let them know I was coming. When I arrive, my heart sinks. The lights are off, the front door locked. I knock. No one's here. I knock again. I should have called. There is no one around. I knock one last time, hoping against odds someone will hear me. Just as I'm about to give up a small voice in my head whispers go check around the back. I walk around the building and see a man my age approaching the side door. I ask if this is the Mosque and he says, "Come with me Brother. I'll show you the way."

We step into a large room with three beautifully tiled arches on the eastern wall. About two dozen men stand talking in small groups. On the other side of a slatted room divider is another dozen women. The man says, "Can you please wait a few minutes? We are going to pray." I look at the clock and see that it is 1:27pm, right before the afternoon Call to Prayer. I sit on a chair in the back as another man steps forward and leads the afternoon prayers, in call and response, standing, bowing, kneeling, praising God. I close my eyes, take a deep breath, and imagine millions of Muslims around the world united in that prayer. I assume that when they are done, the leader will come to the back to talk to me. But, as he finishes, he gestures to me and says, "And now we have a guest who is here to speak with us," indicating that I should join him in front of the three arches! Grateful for my theater background, I gingerly bring my basket and card up and face the congregation.

I thank them for the opportunity to speak. (They invited me in before even learning my name. Talk about audacious hospitality!) I introduce myself as a member of B'nai Tikvah and express how completely heartbroken we were to hear of the attacks on the Mosques in New Zealand. I tell them that our community extends our deepest condolences and offers our prayers, love, and solidarity during these uncertain

times, as neighbors and friends and fellow people of faith. I hold up the beautiful gift basket and explain our Purim tradition of *Mishloach Manot*, and that our Religious School children had baked the Hamentaschen fresh for them the day before. I tell them that we are in this together and to let us know how we can support.

The prayer leader graciously thanks me for coming. He says that it is our humanity that brings our communities together. He says that he heard that the Tree of Life Synagogue in Pittsburgh is fundraising for the victims' families in New Zealand and that we have to take care of each other. When it's over, a crowd of men gather around me, all bright eyes and wide smiles, wanting to shake my hand, thank me for coming, make a human connection. I left the Mosque that day feeling completely renewed and sparkly, clearer than ever that when we give love, it comes back tenfold, that we need to, and can, and will, take care of each other.

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tethered to the tradition, but who also feel the pull on their hearts to uncover more, to learn more, to reveal more, to discover our own oral Torah.

What is our oral Torah at CBT? What messages have been left within the crowns of our community's history for us to discover and reveal? The story of the Jewish people is one of continuity and discontinuity, of breaking down and building back up, responding and renewing. It is woven into nearly every story of our biblical ancestors and into the history of our people from the beginning of time. In some generations, we are responding to tragedy; In others, to rapid change that we are trying to catch up with. We have an opportunity as a community to go on a spiritual search together, to weave together the traditions that have sustained and built us with the new Torah that we are just creating today. The energy is within us to create a stronger CBT, a place where poetry and music are woven into our liturgy as modern love songs to our ancestors, where social justice and egalitarian ideals are our foundation, where we have the courage to say: we believe in the beauty of the tradition as it was, in the myth and the mystery, and we believe that we are meant to make it even better.


